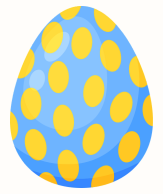

Year R



This first part of the Spring Term in Reception the children learnt all about Traditional Stories. We looked at Goldilocks and The Three Bears, The Three Little Pigs, and The Gingerbread Man. They focused on ordering, retelling of the stories, using puppets, role play, developing lots of speaking and listening skills.

We followed a recipe to make gingerbread biscuits which were very tasty!



We also spent some time learning about Chinese New Year and how it is celebrated. The children loved making some chinese new lanterns, cards, dragons, opening fortune cookies, eating prawn crackers and making and tasting noodles. We also used music and dance to enhance our learning. The children performed a dragon dance.



In the second part of the Spring Term the children have been learning about growing and lifecycles. We have some caterpillars in the class which we are carefully observing. The children have been carrying out lots of planting and observing signs of spring.

The water play has been popular and we are using it for our phonics play.

The children have also been introduced to the woodwork shed and are loving building their own creations using the Japanese Wood Saw and hammers!



Handwriting is improving and the children are really making great progress in their reading and writing and maths- well done everyone! It is lovely to see them being so independent in their own learning.



Year 1 & 2



Wow have we had a busy term in year 1 and 2!

In our science we've been exploring habitats and our trip to the wildlife park really helped bring this to life for us! We saw so many animals and we were able to use this in our learning. We spent time making habitats of animals that we'd seen and doing some research into how their bodies adapt for those habitats!



In our Art we've been exploring watercolours and have been practising painting an arctic scenery. This has included various techniques such as colour mixing, blending, using salt for texture as well as using biro to make parts stand out more in our pictures.



In Geography we've been comparing New York and Southampton and as much as they are different there are some similarities! We've really enjoyed using both the laptops for Google Earth and maps to locate New York and spot the different landmarks and attractions there are in such a big place compared to Southampton!

We've been loving using all our knowledge that we've picked up and putting these into our play projects where we practise the skills we've learnt and showcase them independently within our own learning time! Here's just a few things we've done!



Red Kites Class



This term, Year 3 have enjoyed a wonderful journey of learning, curiosity, and exploration.

We began by learning all about Uganda, focusing especially on what life is like for children living in rural areas. The class were fascinated by the similarities and differences between their own lives and those of Ugandan children. We were very fortunate to be visited by Gill from the Christchurch Deanery, who travels to South West rural Uganda regularly. She shared photographs and stories from her visits, which really brought the topic to life. Gill is also helping us develop links with Rwangaboka Primary School and we are excited about building meaningful connections with the school and learning even more from one another.

In Art, the children explored traditional African designs and learned how to create repeating patterns through printing. They enjoyed experimenting with shapes, colours, and textures to produce bold and vibrant artwork inspired by African textiles.



Our History learning took us back in time to Roman Britain. A highlight of the term was our visit to Fishbourne Roman Palace, where the children discovered mosaics, experienced Roman-style rooms, and learned about life during the Roman occupation. They asked thoughtful questions and demonstrated great curiosity about how people lived nearly two thousand years ago.

We have also been studying the eruption of Mount Vesuvius, using this dramatic historical event to inspire our English work. The children wrote diary entries imagining what it might have been like to witness the eruption in Pompeii. Their writing showed fantastic imagination, emotion, and descriptive detail.

We have greatly missed Mrs Harvey this term, but we have been very lucky to have her daughter, Miss Harvey, teaching the class in her absence. We all wish Mrs Harvey a speedy recovery. She will not be returning immediately after Easter, so a supply teacher will be covering Year 3 for the first few weeks of the summer term until she is well enough to come back.

It has been a busy and exciting term, and the children should feel very proud of everything they have achieved.



Eagles Class



This spring term, Year 4 have been busy exploring a new history topic all about the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings. This follows on beautifully from their previous learning about the Romans in Year 3. To bring the topic to life, we visited Butser Ancient Farm and the children had a great time exploring the outdoor museum, making jewellery and spinning wool. It was a fantastic day and the weather was kind to us.

In maths, the children have continued to work hard on their times tables and have now begun learning about fractions, following their earlier units on addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

Our English work has been inspired by a range of high-quality texts. We began the term using *The Legend of Podkin One-Ear* as a stimulus for writing, and *It Started With a Seed* as our class reading focus. Towards the end of the term, we have been using *Beowulf* to inspire the children's own kenning poems and narrative writing. In DT, the children have been developing their sewing skills by designing and making a stuffed toy linked to *Podkin One-Ear*.

In science, the children have learned all about the digestive system and the journey food takes through the body. A particular highlight was the practical (and memorable!) lesson where they simulated the digestive process and even created model "poo".

Despite the relentless rain, the children in Eagles have had a fantastic spring term and have shown real enthusiasm and resilience in their learning. We are looking forward to many more exciting learning opportunities as we move into the summer term.



Falcons Class



Year 5 have enjoyed a wonderfully busy and enriching term, full of curiosity, creativity and excellent effort across the curriculum.

In History, the children have explored the theme of monarchy through time, learning about the lives and influence of William the Conqueror, Henry VIII, Elizabeth I and Elizabeth II. This has sparked great excitement for their upcoming visit to the Tower of London in May, where they will experience first-hand one of the most iconic royal landmarks in the country.

As part of this topic, the children also examined portraits of Elizabeth I, investigating how symbolism and imagery were used to represent power and authority. Inspired by this, they created their own impressive self-portraits in Art, applying their understanding of royal portraiture. They also explored contouring techniques using mystery bags, relying on their sense of touch to carefully observe shape and form – a fun and challenging way to develop their artistic skills.



During Science Week, the children revisited their learning about gravity, designing and testing paper aeroplanes and taking part in the exciting Egg Drop Challenge.

Science lessons have continued to be highly engaging, with Year 5 exploring the fascinating world of blood, the human heart and the circulatory system. They now have a strong understanding of how blood moves around the body and why keeping our hearts healthy is so important.

In RE, the children have been learning about the symbolism of the cross at Easter, linking closely with our assemblies on Lent. This has encouraged thoughtful discussion about tradition, faith and the deeper meaning of Easter.

In Maths, the children have shown fantastic effort as they tackled the challenging – but rewarding – topics of fractions, decimals and percentages. Their determination and resilience have really shone through, and we are very proud of the progress they have made.

It has been a busy and productive term, and we are incredibly proud of the children's enthusiasm, curiosity and hard work across all subjects. We look forward to another exciting term ahead!





Barn Owls Class



This term, Year 6 have been working incredibly hard as they prepare for their SATs in grammar, reading and maths, which take place in May. We have been really impressed with their determination, focus and the fantastic progress they have made.

In Writing, the children have created their own survival recounts, written formal letters from Ernest Shackleton at the moment the Endurance collapsed, and produced narrative pieces inspired by *The Highwayman* by Alfred Noyes.

In Science, the children have been investigating sound and learning how animals and plants adapt to survive in challenging environments. Our Geography topic has focused on tourism in Antarctica, where the children have explored both the advantages and disadvantages of visiting such a fragile environment. This has led to some lively and thoughtful discussions!

As we come to the end of a very busy and productive term, we would like to wish all the children a restful and well-deserved Easter break. We hope they return refreshed and ready to take on their SATs with confidence, as well as enjoy their final term at PPS.

It's an exciting time ahead for them, with memories still to be made – including our Year 6 residential and all the special events that mark their last months before moving on to secondary school. We are incredibly proud of them and can't wait to see what they achieve next.
